TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission into the Freshman Class are examined as follows:

LATIN.

In nine books of Virgil's *Aeneid*,
The *Catiline* of Sallust,
Six *Orations* of Cicero,
Twenty exercises of Arnold's *Latin Prose Composition*,
and in *Harkness' Latin Grammar*.

GREEK.

In three books of Xenophon's *Anabasis*,
The first book of Homer's *Iliad*, and in *Hadley's Greek Grammar*.

MATHEMATICS.

In *Robinson's* or *Greenleaf's Arithmetic*, and in the first two sections of *Robinson's Algebra*.

ENGLISH.

In Mitchell's Ancient Geography, and in Worcester's Ancient History.

All candidates for advanced standing will be examined in the preparatory studies, and also in those previously pursued by the class they propose to enter, or in other studies equivalent to them.

Certificates of regular dismissal will be required from those who have been members of other colleges.

The regular examinations for admission to College take place on Friday succeeding Commencement, and on Wednesday preceding the first day of the Fall Term.

Students will be required to take notes of all lectures, and they will be examined upon the same.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

There are ten State scholarships in the hands of the Governor; and in designating them, preference is to be given to the children of those who have fallen in defence of their country, and always to students who are indigent and meritorious.

EXAMINATIONS.

All the classes are examined at the close of each term; privately at the close of the Fall and Spring Terms, and publicly at the close of the Summer Term.

PRIZES.

For proficiency in general scholarship prizes will be awarded as follows:

To the Junior Class—A first prize, the office of Assistant Librarian, and a second of eight dollars.

To the Sophomore Class—A first prize, the office of Second Assistant Librarian, and a second of seven dollars.

To the Freshman Class—A first prize, the office of Third Assistant Librarian, and a second of six dollars.

RHETORICAL EXERCISES.

The students of all the classes declaim and prepare Themes and Translations on such subjects and from such authors as may be appointed, and when required participate in debates held before the Professor of Rhetoric.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

The LITERARY FRATERNITY and PHILOMATHEAN SOCIETY hold weekly meetings for improvement in writing and speaking. They have their own libraries, which are increasing from year to year.

RANK BILLS.

These are sent to the parent or guardian of each student at the close of every term, giving an abstract of the merits, demerits and general demeanor of the student.

GYMNASIUM.

In accordance with a vote of the Corporation at their last session, a Gymnasium with spacious ball ground, attached has been erected.

At the annual meeting of the corporation it was voted to erect, as soon as the necessary funds can be secured, a Library and Art Building, to be called Skinner Hall, in memory of the late Francis Skinner of Boston. The site is on Skinner Street—a street recently opened by the city of Lewiston, in front of the College buildings.

The Colder Professorship is called in honor of Rev. James Colder, D.D., of Harrisburg, Pa.

The Bardwell Professorship is called in honor of Josiah Bardwell, Esq., of Boston.

The Ward Professorship is called in honor of George L. Ward, Esq., of Boston.

Mrs. John M. Frye and Mrs. Archibald Wakefield have donated to the College ten thousand square feet on the summit of David's Mountain (including a passage way to the same twenty feet wide) as a site for a contemplated Observatory.
