# Creative Commons Licenses

### Where do CC Licenses Apply?

Creative Commons licenses can be applied to copyrighted material only

#### Where do Creative Commons licenses apply?

A Creative Commons license can be applied to a work that is protected by copyright, by the copyright owner.

This allows copyright owners to intentionally enable certain uses of their work by the public (without permission).

If the desired use of a work would typically be limited by copyright law, but the CC license allows for the use, then the use is permissible. A Creative Commons license <u>cannot</u> be applied to a work when the work is not copyrightable.

A Creative Commons license <u>cannot</u> be applied to a work in the public domain.

If a copyrighted work has a CC license, but a use of the work would fall under an exception or limitation to copyright, then the use is not affected by the limitations of copyright or limitations of the CC license.



### **Layers of Creative**Commons Licenses

- **Legal Code:** the legally enforceable terms and conditions for the license
- Human Readable Layer: a summary of the legal terms of the license, easily understood by non-lawyers
- Machine Readable Layer: a version of what is and is not allowed by a license that is coded in a way that can be read by search engines and software applications

### **Elements of Creative Commons Licenses**

- **Attribution:** a component of all CC Licenses, requires the license owner to be credited when the work is used
- NonCommercial: optional element, indicates that a work, or adaptations of it, may not be used for money making purposes
- **NoDerivatives:** optional element, indicates that no adaptations of the original work may be shared publicly
- **ShareAlike:** optional element, indicates that adaptations must be shared under the same license (or <u>a compatible license</u>) as the original

#### **Attribution License (CC-BY):**

The licensor of the original work must be attributed.

- → Others can use the work for commercial or non commercial purposes.
- → Others can publicly share adaptations.


#### **Attribution-ShareAlike License (CC-BY-SA):**

The licensor of the original work must be attributed.

- → Others can use the work for commercial or non commercial purposes.
- → Others can publicly share adaptations, under the same license (or <u>a compatible license</u>).

#### **Creative Commons Licenses**

#### **Attribution-NonCommercial License (CC-BY-NC):**


The licensor of the original work must be attributed.

- → Others can publicly share adaptations.
- → Others can use the work, and adaptations of the work, for non commercial purposes only.

#### Attribution-NonCommercial-ShareAlike License (CC-BY-NC-SA):

The licensor of the original work must be attributed.

- → Others can publicly share adaptations, under the same license (or <u>a compatible license</u>).
- → Others can use the work, and adaptations of the work, for non commercial purposes only.

#### **Creative Commons Licenses**

#### **Attribution-NoDerivatives (CC-BY-ND):**


The licensor of the original work must be attributed.

- → Others can use the work for commercial or non commercial purposes.
- → Others may not publicly share any adapted form of the original work.

#### Attribution-NonCommercial-NoDerivatives (CC-BY-NC-ND):

The licensor of the original work must be attributed.

- → Others can use the work for non commercial purposes only.
- → Others may not publicly share any adapted form of the original work.

#### The Public Domain

#### **Public Domain Dedication Tool**

- CC0 [CC "Zero"]
- Used by a copyright owner to dedicate their works to the public domain

#### **Public Domain Mark**

 Used to indicate that a work already exists in the public domain

# **Applying Creative Commons Licenses**

Applying an open license to your work

#### Applying a Creative Commons license to your work

- **Remember:** Only the copyright owner of a work can apply an open license to a work.
- Creative Commons provides a <u>license chooser</u> to help copyright owners select a license.
- CC licenses are irrevocable: The open license will dictate how others may use the work for as long as copyright applies, wherever copyright would apply to the intended use.

#### Applying a Creative Commons license to your work

Make it easy for others to use and attribute your work the way you intend. Include the:

- Title
- Author
- Source
- License

# **Creating Collections or Adaptations**

Using openly licensed work

#### Licensing considerations for collections

- Proper attribution must be given for all the individual works in the collection.
- If any of the openly licensed works included in a collection include the NonCommercial element in their license, the new collection may not be used for money-making purposes.
- In the case of a collection, further reuse of content from the <u>original works</u> is limited by the <u>original licenses</u> of those works. Only the new elements presented are copyrightable by the arranger of the collection: the order of the items, original supplementary content like an introduction, etc.



#### Licensing considerations for adaptations

- > Proper attribution must be given for all individual works inspiring the adaptation.
- Adaptations of works that include the NonCommercial element in their open license may not be used for money-making purposes, nor can further adaptations down the line.
- Adaptations of works that include a ShareAlike element in the license must be shared with same license (or a <u>compatible license</u>).
- Adaptations of works with a NoDerivatives element can't be shared publicly.



## Creating Adaptations & Remixes

- The chart to the right provides a helpful visualization of whether or not two openly licensed works can by combined & remixed by an adaptor.
- If you create an adaptation that uses multiple pre-existing works, it is best practice to license the adaptation with the most restrictive license of those you are combining.
