MUSKIE APPOINTS CAMPBELL DOMESTIC POLICY DIRECTOR

Senator Edmund S. Muskie today announced the appointment of James S. Campbell as Director of Domestic Policy Development, effective April 1, 1971. He and Mr. W. A. K. Lake, who recently became Director of Foreign Policy Development for Senator Muskie, will direct the two principal Divisions of Senator Muskie's policy development and research staff headed by Donald E. Nicoll.

Mr. Campbell served from 1968 to 1969 as General Counsel to the Eisenhower National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence, and as Co-Director of that Commission's Task Force on Law and Law Enforcement. From 1967 to 1968, he was Special Assistant to Assistant Attorney General Donald F. Turner, in the Antitrust Division of the Department of Justice, and from 1964 to 1965, he served as Law Clerk for U. S. Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas.

Mr. Campbell, 32, presently practices law with the Washington, D. C. firm of Wilmer, Cutler and Pickering. He is Consultant to the Democratic Policy Council's Committee on Democracy and Government.

Mr. Campbell, who received his undergraduate education at Yale University and his law degree from Stanford University, is co-author and editor of Law and Order Reconsidered (Bantam Books and Praeger: 1970). His other published works include "Violence in America," in The New York Times Encyclopedic Almanac for 1971, and "The Usefulness of Commission Studies of Collective Violence," in The Annals, September, 1970.

Mr. Campbell and his wife, the former Mary Eager, live in Chevy Chase, Maryland with their three children: Catherine, Julia and John.
